50/50 Tree Program Set For October & November

Mayor Hastings and Village Trustees are encouraging residents to participate in our 2019 tree replacement program.

Over 600 trees are scheduled to be planted over the next several years to replace the green and white ash trees that were removed over the last five years.


The Village Public Works Department removed over 1,400 green and white ash trees throughout the Village parkways that cost the Village well over \$250,000.00. The diseased ash trees that were removed made up over 35% of the Village tree canopy.

The 50/50 tree replacement program will allow residents to have a parkway tree planted in the next 30-60 days for a cost of \$125.00 with the Village covering the remaining half which includes the cost of planting and mulching being done by the Public Works Department.

Orland Hills Tax Rate Remains at Low Level

Property taxes are a hot topic right now. But just how much of your property tax dollars go to the Village? Probably not as much as you think. About 94% of your property taxes are used to pay for schools (elementary, high schools, community college), county fees, and municipal services such as mosquito abatement and fire protection.

Overall, only 5.57% of your 2018 property tax bill (paid in 2019) goes to the Village of Orland Hills. This money is used for specific Village services such as police protection, recreation facilities and programs, senior programs, the PACE Dial-A-Ride bus and Public Works responsibilities such as snow plowing.

When Mayor Hastings entered office over 26 years ago, he pledged that he would see to it that the Orland Hills tax rate remained at a low level. Since then, Mayor Hastings has worked to keep the Village portion of your tax bill as reasonable as possible through continued cooperation with the Village Board members whose support of the same goals has been steadfast.

"Since the first tax levy that I ever presented after being elected, I have seen to it that the tax rate for the Village has remained at a low level. We proudly boast of having one of the lowest tax rates in the southwest suburbs. If you compare Orland Hills Tax Rate against any community around, you will see that we have held to our pledge," Mayor Hastings recently stated.

WHERE DO YOUR PROPERTY TAX DOLLARS GO?

LESS THAN 6 CENTS of every property tax dollar you pay goes to the Village of Orland Hills for village services, including police, public works, recreation, parks and other village services.

Cook County, schools, fire protection districts, Water Reclamation District, mosquito abatement and others.

Residents are invited to “Share the Cost” of a Tree.

Orland Hill’s 50/50 Tree Program is a cost-sharing program that gives residents the opportunity to purchase a tree for their parkway at half of the cost, with the Village paying for the other half. This is a wonderful way to add beauty and enhance the property values of our community. All species available are conducive to parkway planting and soil conditions in our area. A list with descriptions, to assist in selecting trees for your parkway is listed on the form.

New PACE Bus Now In Service

Mayor Kyle R. Hastings is proud to announce the recent delivery of a new 12 passenger 2019 bus to replace our current vehicle. Mayor Hastings is a member of the PACE Board of Directors and has worked closely with PACE to upgrade and replace the existing passenger van that the Village has leased from PACE over the last seven years.

“Being able to serve on the PACE Board all of these years and helping to provide affordable transportation throughout the suburbs has been my number one goal. Orland Hills will continue to provide the PACE Municipal Vehicle Program with cost-effective transportation options to our residents,” said Mayor Hastings.

Our bus driver will pick you up at your residence and bring you to any site within the Orland Hills service area for \$2.00. You must request service 24 hours in advance. Seniors 65 and older are absolutely free. The service area is 135th Street on the North, Oak Park Avenue on the East, Interstate-80 on the South, and Will-Cook Road on the West. DID YOU KNOW A PET LICENSE IS REQUIRED?

All residents that own dogs and cats over four months of age need to get a pet license tag for their pet. Just bring the valid rabies vaccination certificate from a registered veterinarian showing the animal has been inoculated. Fees are as follows: Fees are as follows:

Spayed or Neutered	\$2.50
Not Spayed or Not Neutered	\$4.00

Therefore, when you are coming in for your vehicle sticker in June or July, license your animals too!!

It is hereby declared a nuisance and shall be unlawful for any person to own more than five (5) dogs, or any combination of dogs and cats totaling five (5).



DO NOT DUMP LAWN CLIPPINGS

Please remember that when you are cutting your lawn, the Public Works Department requests residents not to dump lawn clippings or any other debris in or around retention ponds or Village lakes. When debris is dumped, it blocks the water flow, which can result in flooding! If a resident should witness anyone dumping such debris, please call the Village Hall or Police Department. You can remain anonymous but give the address of the person or persons dumping debris, so a warning can be issued. We all need to take a part in keeping our Village clean of debris and the storm water flowing to prevent flooding. Your help is much appreciated.

MAILBOX IN BAD SHAPE? NOW IS A GOOD TIME TO REPAIR IT!

If you notice that your mailbox is in dis-repair (rotted, leaning, door broke etc.) Before the weather gets too cold, it would be a great time to fix your mailbox!

STREET SWEEPING

Please have your vehicles moved off the street the first Tuesday of every month. Street Sweeping will end after November 5th! Remember!!!! Cars should be kept off the street during snow fall.

YARD WASTE

Please use your yard waste can bags. Please come to the Village Hall to get your free yard waste stickers. Yard Waste ends November 29th! This will be the last day until Spring.

BRANCHES

All branches can be put out for pick-up by Waste Management. HOWEVER,

must be no longer than 4 feet, less than 50lbs. and bundled (tied) very securely. IF these requirements are met, Waste Management will have no problem picking them up.

IMPORTANT NOTE:

If you cut YOUR trees on private property (your backyard etc.) YOU are responsible for bundling, tying, neatly bringing them to the curb, and making sure they are secure for Waste Management to pick up on garbage day. If you chose not to do so, call a private company. Please understand... that the Public Works dumpster is NOT for your private use.

RESIDENTS!!

While raking or blowing your leaves, please do not put them in the street. The leaves then blow and clog up the sewers! Thanks for your attention to this matter! Bag them for the Waste Management yard waste pick up.

Please tell your lawn service not to blow the leaves in the retention areas as it will clog up the flow of water!!! All leaves should be bagged or put in the yard waste container!

Fall Safety Tips

Fall is a beautiful time of year. The leaves change colors, the holidays are approaching and fireplaces and fire pits are so warm and inviting. It's also a great time to remember to practice the safety tips we have learned. As a reminder, here are some fall safety tips.

Driving: With hours of daylight decreasing and inclement weather a frequent occurrence, it is a time for drivers to pay a little more attention to road and traffic conditions.

Slow down! The faster you drive, especially on wet, slippery roads, the longer it takes to stop your vehicle.

Turn on your headlights! Many cars today are equipped with day time running lights. If yours isn't one of them, get in the habit of turning on your headlights. It allows you to see hazards more clearly and other drivers to see you.

Buckle Up! Most drivers do this regularly, but everyone should use their seatbelt. Using your seatbelt is the best protection against injury in a collision or sudden stop.

Put the phone down!! Texting while driving is against the law. Even if you use a hands free device, studies have shown that just talking on the phone is a driver distraction.

Safety at home is important too.

Practice these home safety tips to keep your family safe.

Service your furnace! Call a qualified service technician to check your furnace. A certified technician can find leaks and other problems that if left undetected can cause fires, injuries, and even death.

Check your smoke detectors! Fall is a good time to test your smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. Change your batteries every year.

Practice fireplace safety! When using your fireplace always be sure the flue is open before starting a fire. Use a fireplace screen to prevent sparks from entering the home and to keep pets away from the fire.

Watch what your children do online! Technology is a wonderful thing for business and pleasure. It's also a way for criminals to steal your personal information. They also use it to lure unsuspecting children!

Use parental blocks or better yet, check the computer yourself to make sure the sites your child is visiting are acceptable. Many sex offenders use the internet to prey on children.

Check the sex offender websites! Knowledge is power. Talk to your children about safety and warn them about predators. As parents, we need to do all we can to protect our children.

BUILDING DEPARTMENT

BE PREPARED FOR FALL STORMS

Most of Orland Hills' flooding and drainage problems occur during and after heavy storms. These can happen at any time. There are many things that can be done to prepare for the storm and the water problem that may follow.

Here are some things to do:

- ▶ Keep ditches, drainage swales, detention basins and storm sewer inlets clear of debris.
- ▶ Check with the Building Department to determine if you are in a mapped floodplain or if there is a history of flood problems in your areas. The Building Department can be visited at Village Hall or reached by calling 349-4887.
- ▶ Ask the Building Department about how you can protect yourself from your water problem.
- ▶ During a rain, keep tuned to local radio or television stations to see if there is a tornado or flash flooding hazard.

The Village Building Department in the Village Hall (349-4887) Provides the following:

- Information on whether a property is in a mapped floodplain and related Flood Insurance Rate Map Data;
- Records of past flooding;
- Free copies of the Village's Guide to Flood Protection ;
- Advice on how to protect a building from water problems;
- Guidance on the laws that govern construction and property improvements;
- Site visits to view the cause and possible solutions to a problem.

Flood maps and flood protection references are also available at the Tinley Park Public Library.

FLOOD SAFETY:

- ▶ **Do not walk through flowing water.** Drowning is the number one cause of flood deaths. Currents can be deceptive; six inches of moving water can knock you off your feet. Use a pole or stick to ensure that the ground is still there before you go through an area where the water is not flowing.
- ▶ **Do not drive through a flooded area.** More people drown in their cars than anywhere else.
- ▶ **Don't drive around road barriers;** the road or bridge may be washed out.
- ▶ **Stay away from power lines and electrical wires.** The number two flood killer after drowning is electrocution. Electrical current can travel through water. Report downed power lines to the Police Department at 349-4334.
- ▶ **Look before you step.** After a flood, the ground and floors are covered with debris including broken bottles and nails. Floors and stairs that have been covered with mud can be very slippery.
- ▶ **Be alert for gas leaks.** Use a flashlight to inspect for damage. Don't smoke or use candles, lanterns, or an open flame unless you know the gas has been turned off and the area has been ventilated.
- ▶ **Carbon monoxide exhaust kills.** Use a generator or other gasoline-powered machine outdoors. The same goes for camping stoves. Charcoal fumes are exceptionally deadly. Cook with charcoal only outdoors.
- ▶ **Clean everything that got wet.** Floodwaters have picked up sewage and chemicals from roads, farms, factories, and storage buildings. Spoiled food, flooded cosmetics, and medicine can be health hazards. When in doubt, throw them out.
- ▶ **Take good care of yourself.** Recovering from a flood is a big job. It is tough on both the body and the spirit and the effects a disaster has on you and your family may last a long time. Keep your eyes open for signs of anxiety, stress, and fatigue in you and your family.

TRAFFIC SAFETY

Mayor Kyle Hastings and the Orland Hills Police Department are committed to the safety of our residents. Accordingly, the Mayor is asking residents to please exercise caution while driving.

Many of our residents are very lax about coming to a complete stop at stop signs and exceeding the posted speed limits. Many drivers are driving while distracted.



Distracted driving isn't just using your cell phone while driving. It's any activity that takes your focus off of driving. Eating, drinking, and or applying make- up while driving are all considered actions that constitute distracted driving.

The police department will strictly enforce traffic violations. Please drive safely.

SAFETY TIPS

Loss of utilities can leave communities without such vital services as police, fire, and medical protection. JULIE's tips for outdoor digging projects include:

1. Call **JULIE (1-800-892-0123)** before you dig
2. Wait the required amount of time (two working days)
3. Respect the marks
4. Dig with care

Today, more utility companies and municipalities that supply power, gas, water, and telecommunications are delivering these services underground. With this in mind, JULIE, Inc. and its members are promoting the importance of calling the Illinois One-Call System before any digging projects and stressing safe-digging practices to professional excavators and homeowners as part of a statewide "Dig Safely Illinois" education campaign.

"According to state law, anyone planning an outdoor project that requires digging, regardless of the depth or the size of the outdoor project, should call JULIE at 1-800-892-0123," said Kevin Chmura, director of Public Relations at JULIE, Inc. "The call to JULIE and service provided by members are free to the excavator. Call center operators are available to receive and process calls 24 hours a day, seven days a week."

JULIE, Inc. is a not-for-profit corporation that provides excavators with a toll-free number (1-800-892-0123) for the free locating and marking of underground facilities. JULIE serves as a notification service for underground facility owners, taking information about planned excavations and distributing this information to its membership. It is then the responsibility of each facility owner to mark the location of their underground facilities at the excavation site. JULIE neither owns nor marks any underground facilities.

JULIE, Inc. promotes an easier, safer digging environment and serves the

entire state of Illinois outside of the city of Chicago, which is covered by DIGGER. Illinois law requires anyone digging to call JULIE at least two working days prior to the start of excavation and to begin that project within 14 calendar days from the call. The 48 hour notice does not include Saturdays, Sundays or holidays.

Established in 1974, JULIE represents 1,750 members. JULIE has 100 employees during peak periods and is located in a state of the art facility in Joliet, Illinois. For more information visit www.illinois1call.com.

TYPES OF OUTDOOR PROJECTS

Common examples of homeowner projects that require a call to JULIE before digging include putting up a fence, installing a swing set, a mailbox post or new water feature, building of a deck or room addition; preparing a new garden area or adding new trees, bushes or shrubs.

SNOWPLOWING SEASON IS RIGHT AROUND THE CORNER!

HERE ARE SOME HELPFUL HINTS THAT COULD HELP THIS SEASON RUN VERY SMOOTH!!

As always, our Public Works Department during the snowplowing season does their very best to plow our streets as quick and as efficient as possible. The Village receives many complaints during this season. One of the most frequent complaints is the snowplowing in of the mailboxes and driveways. This is unavoidable! When plowing the streets, the snow rolls off the end of the plow at the curb line. In order to keep our streets clean, the snow must go somewhere.

As a department, we are asking for the resident's assistance. If you could please shovel the snow from your driveway, mailbox or sidewalk onto your grassy areas and not into the street it would be greatly appreciated. In this way, when the plower comes along it won't simply push the snow back onto your driveway and mailbox. If you use your parkway and lawn for the excess snow, this problem can be eliminated. Also, if residents can remove all portable basketball nets off the street for the winter so the plows can do their job. The Public Works Department will not be responsible for any damages that may occur.

We would also appreciate that on garbage day, residents set their trashcans behind the curb line. After trash is picked up return the receptacles to their proper storage as soon as possible to avoid the cans being blown and rolling onto the street.

Residents who park on the streets where snow route signs have been placed are being asked to move their vehicles and keep them off the street if there is a winter storm possible predicted in the area. It makes it so much easier for the snow plows to come through the street without having to go around the vehicles. In the event a vehicle has not been moved, Village ordinance allows the police to issue tickets and/or towing of the vehicle. All mailboxes must comply with the U.S. Postmaster's requirements, which are:

The front of the mailbox should be even with the curb line and no more than 10-12 inches from the curb line towards your house. The bottom of the mailbox should be 36-42 inches above the top edge of the curb. They are not to encroach past the curb line. Please check your mailboxes to make sure that they are not leaning over the curb.

In the event if a mailbox is hit with a snowplow, we will repair the mailbox as soon as possible. Please call the Village with your address. If the box is damaged by heavy snow or snow being plowed towards it, it is the homeowner's responsibility to repair or replace.

BUILDING DEPARTMENT

ADDRESS NUMBERS ON STRUCTURES

Both the Village Code (150.185) and the Fire Protection District Code require that all structures must have address numbers displayed and easily visible from the street. We strongly urge each homeowner to check their home for compliance. Townhouses, Condominiums and Apartments are to be clearly marked, as well as, single family structures.

Ambulance, fire or police personnel are only able to find the right house if you help. You need to have your building number on your home.

- We recommend that the numbers be at least three (3) inches high.
- The color of the numbers should contrast with the surface.
- The numbers should not blend into the surface where they are affixed.
- Trees or other landscaping should not block the numbers.

Businesses should have their space identified in the front and the rear preferably with the business name, as well as, the space address, number or letter designation of the space.

Remember that emergency service personnel can lose time in responding to your call if they are unable to find your home. Clear identification of your home can save a life, and that life could be your own.



REMINDING ALL RESIDENTS DURING SNOW PLOW SEASON:

Please remove all portable basketball nets from the street and/or close to the street! The Village is not responsible for damaging with the snow plow.


SNOW SHOVELING FOR THE ELDERLY

Butterfly Gardens Planted at Lake Lorin & Ashbourne Lake

How are our butterfly gardens fluttering? That's the question Mayor Hastings and the Village Trustees recently asked themselves.

Over the last month, butterfly gardens were planted at Ashbourne Lake and Lake Lorin. The idea for the gardens flows from our elected officials wanting to improve passive recreational activities in our parks for all residents.

Creating a garden that is a sanctuary for butterflies is not too difficult. A small area at each of our Lakes was cut out and planted with three species to attract butterflies. Each garden has over 30 plants including, black-eyed susan (*rudbeckia*), milkweed (*asclepias*), and purple cone flowers (*echinacea purpurea*). All of the plants will grow to a height 18-24 inches as they mature over the next 3-5 years.

The Ashbourne Lake Garden is on the west end of the lake situated between two large weeping willow trees offering a beautiful view of Ashbourne Lake and the fountain. The Lake Lorin butterfly garden is also on the west end of the lake behind the Recreation Center looking east over the beautiful wetland/lake.

Benches will be installed in the spring. By creating these small-scale wild spaces, we hope to attract many butterfly species. Enjoy the garden additions as you stroll through our parks!
