Orland Hills Tax Refund

The application process for the historic tax refund took place during the week of January 6-11 at Georgios Banquet & Quality Inn. Orland Hills is one of a handful of towns who gives money back to their residents. The Village of Crestwood is the pioneer who started the refund of tax money to residents decades ago with money coming from their strong retail tax base and first generation of OTB licenses.

Mayor Kyle Hastings said, "The Board of Trustees and I are proud to implement this tax refund. We run our Village like a successful business, unlike other towns you hear and read about. This is a great moment in Orland Hills where we can say that many of us live property tax free or pay minimal property tax."

Our Village of Orland Hills Board provided a referendum to voters asking whether the Village should rebate a portion of cannabis tax money to residents. Our residents spoke and overwhelmingly approved the referendum.

The formula for the tax refund is as follows:

\$500,000 divided by the number of applicants = (maximum) refund amount

We are estimating 1,000 tax paying homeowners applying. So, we will take \$500,000 divided by 1,000 to equal the tax money the approved applicants/homeowners will receive. Then that will be the (maximum) refund paid to approved homeowners.

There are several revenue streams that enter into Orland Hills in order for our Village to operate. But the most direct impact to our residents is Orland Hills property tax. Property taxes go to pay for our police protection, all aspects of public works, the recreation department operations, general administration of the Village, and all other services the Village provides.

Since we are estimating 1,000 tax paying homeowners to apply, here are 3 examples of refunds:

► Example #1

You pay \$250 property tax to the Village of Orland Hills:

\$500,000 divided by 1,000 homeowners = \$500

You will receive a check for the entire \$250 in tax you paid. The other half of the \$500 will be placed into a line item fund for the next tax refund.

► Example #2

You pay \$500 property tax to the Village of Orland Hills:

\$500,000 divided by 1,000 homeowners = \$500

You will receive a \$500 check. The entire property tax will be refunded to you. Therefore, as a taxpayer, you will pay zero property tax to Orland Hills.

► Example #3

You pay \$750 property tax to the Village of Orland Hills:

\$500,000 divided by 1,000 homeowners = \$500

You will receive a \$500 check. The remaining \$250 will be the difference between the total Village amount and the amount of tax refund.

This property tax refund provides many benefits to us in Orland Hills. Here are a few that come to mind. First, residents receive tax money back. Second, this will increase the home values for residents of Orland Hills. There will be a tremendous demand of people wanting to live in our town. Lastly, what town can you live in where you pay little or zero money for public services? There are a few towns that refund tax money. But Orland Hills is one of the few to refund all or a good portion of property tax.

Mayor Hastings added, "This is another example of why Orland Hills is a great place to live! Whether you use this refund check for your taxes or another bill, this is another great moment in our Village. Enjoy your refund!"

Last spring we also opened our new outdoor Pickleball courts. We currently have three courts for our community to use. The courts were continuously busy until daylight savings took effect. At the end of July we began hosting practices for the newly formed Orland Hills / Tinley Park Bobcats Tackle Football program. The inaugural home game was held on Sunday, August 25th against Crete. Overall, this partnership went well and Village staff did a fantastic job maintaining the field conditions and being readily available to help.

The 42nd Annual Fishing Derby was held at Ashbourne Lake on Saturday, August 3rd. More than 130 people participated in the event, which included 40 registered anglers. Some of the largest fish caught at the fishing derby were a 6-1/2" pan fish, a 13-1/4" largemouth bass and a 16" catfish!





Fall Activities

In early fall, the Orland Hills Wolves Youth Flag Football League kicked off their 5th season at Kelly Park. The players began with clinics, team practices, scrimmages, and league games. Every year the league gets larger. Thanks to Joey's Food Truck being here every game day.

In October, residents wearing awesome costumes attended the 31st Annual Halloween Costume Bash. Festivities included fun Halloween themed music provided by Mobile DJ Services (Judy Jenks), candy and treats from rec staff members, jumpies inside the gym, and a costume judging contest. FLASH FLOODS WINTER STORMS

Winter storms can cause flash flooding! Please remember to check your sump pump and discharge line to insure they are working properly. Check your gutters & downspouts to insure they divert water away from your foundation. If you have a sewer near your home, check to make sure the grate is free & clear of debris. Time spent now could protect against basement flooding.

Protect Yourself From Flooding

If you live near Tinley Creek, or if you have experienced water problems in the past, you shouldn't wait for the problem to go away. Here are some things you can do:

Get the information:

- ➤ The Building Department can tell you if you are in a mapped flood zone and provide additional information needed for a flood insurance policy. Call the Building Department at 708-349-4887.
- ► Ask the Building Department staff to visit your property to see what advice they have on the cause of the problem and possible solutions.
- ► Ask for a free copy of the Village's *Guide to Flood Protection*. It includes many helpful ideas on what you can do to be ready for the next storm.
- ► Check out flood protection references in the Tinley Park Public Library.

Keep Your Easement Open:

One of the biggest causes of flooding problems in Orland Hills has been obstructions built or placed in the drainage easements that were established along lot lines. These areas were set aside to carry water away from your house without flooding your neighbors. Keep them open.

Get Insured:

Flood insurance is highly recommended. Remember, even if the last storm or flood missed you or you have done some floodproofing, the next flood could be worse. Most homeowner's insurance policies do not cover property for flood damage.

Orland Hills participates in the National Flood Insurance Program. Local insurance agents can sell a flood insurance policy under rules and rates set by the Federal government. Any agent can sell a policy and all agents must charge the same rates.

Any house can be covered by a flood insurance policy. It does not matter if they are in the mapped floodplain or out of it. Detached garages and accessory buildings are covered under the policy for the lot's main building. Separate coverage can be obtained for the building's structure and for its contents (except for money, valuable papers, and the like). The *structure* generally includes everything that stays with a house when it is sold, including the furnace, cabinets, built in appliances, and wall-to-wall carpeting.

There is no coverage for things outside the house, like the driveway and landscaping. Renters can buy contents coverage, even if the owner does not buy structural coverage on the building.

Some people have purchased flood insurance because it was required by the bank when they got a mortgage or home improvement loan. *If you have a policy, check it closely*. You may only have structural coverage (because that's all that banks require). During the kind of flooding that happens in Orland Hills, there is usually more damage to the furniture and contents than there is to the structure.

Protect your property:

There are many ways to protect your home from a water problem. They include:

- ► Regrading your yard so water flows away from your house toward the drainage swale or street
- Elevating a building on a crawlspace so that flood waters do not enter or reach any damageable portions of it
- ► Constructing barriers out of fill or concrete between the building and flood waters
- "Floodproofing" so the building is not damaged when the water comes
- ▶ Preventing sewer backup with a standpipe, valve or overhead sewer
- Installing a backup power supply for your sump pump
- Removing valuable contents out of the basement when the flood comes

These are discussed in more detail in the Village's *Guide* to Flood Protection available free at the Village Hall, and in other references in the Library.

Several insurance companies have sump pump failure or sewer backup coverage that can be added to a homeowner's insurance policy. Each company has different amounts of coverage, exclusions, deductibles, and arrangements. Most are riders that cost extra. Most exclude damage from surface flooding that would be covered by a National Flood

Don't wait for the next flood to buy insurance protection. There is a 30 day waiting period before National Flood Insurance coverage takes effect. Contact your insurance agent for more information on rates and coverage.

Insurance policy. The cost varies from nothing to up to about \$75 for a rider on your homeowner's insurance premium.

Basements, split levels and bi-levels:

There is limited coverage for basements and the below grade floors of bi-levels and tri-levels. The National Flood Insurance Program defines "basement" as "Any area of the building, including any sunken room or sunken portion of a room, having its floor below ground level (sub-grade) on all sides." This includes split levels and bi-levels.

Coverage under building or structural coverage is limited to specific items needed for the operation of the building, such as a furnace, water heater, clothes washer, and dryer. There is very limited coverage for finishings, such as wallpaper and carpeting, and contents. Flood insurance only covers damage when there is a general condition of surface flooding in the area.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT



2024 IN REVIEW

As a new year begins, let's look back at the past year to see what the Public Works Department has been up to...

We started off 2024 with snowplowing. SNOW PLOWING WILL ALWAYS BE THE #1 PRIORITY IN OUR VILLAGE.

Our residents deserve the safest and cleanest streets! Not only did we snowplow, we also made sure that our Senior Citizens were able to safely walk out of their homes to their vehicle, mailbox, and the Dial-a-Ride bus service. We cleaned 160 senior citizens' driveways each time the snowfall was 2" or greater.

Spring and summer was a busy time repairing potholes, clearing storm sewers, and painting all fire hydrants for better visual identification by the Orland Fire Protection District. In addition, the Public Works Department maintains the detention areas in town to help the flow of stormwater to help prevent flooding in the Village.

Last year, the Village completed many street resurfacing projects. The areas completed were: 162nd St from Hawthorn to Quail Ct, 170th St from 88th Ave to 89th Ave, 88th Ct from 170th St to the south end of the Cul-de-Sac, 92nd Ave from 171st St to 170th Pl, 169th St from 89th Ave to 90th Ave, and 169th Pl from 89th Ave to 90th Ave.

In December, the Public Works Department had so much fun working with Santa and decorating our trucks for our Santa parade. What a great feeling we had seeing many of our residents, neighbors, and friends out with their children, waving and having a good time seeing Santa drive by.

Throughout the year, Public Works continually performed maintenance and repairs on all vehicles in order to provide our residents with the best services possible. In addition, the department is continually busy keeping a close eye on vacant homes while driving through the Village streets. When a home appears vacant or the yard seems unmanaged, we determine if the home is vacant and who owns it, then notify the owner to maintain the property. If the property is too unsightly, we cut the grass and pick up whatever garbage is there, leaving a better appearance of the property for surrounding neighbors.

As you can see, the Public Works Department has been busy. We enjoy making our Village a beautiful place for our residents to live.

VILLAGE OF ORLAND HILLS 31st ANNUAL "DESIGN THE VILLAGE VEHICLE STICKER" CONTEST

The Village of Orland Hills is pleased to carry on the tradition to host the annual vehicle sticker art contest. The Village's vehicle stickers are due for renewal July 15, 2025. Therefore, it is time to turn to the artistic talent of our young Village residents to get involved in their community and design a sticker that reflects *what they feel the Village represents*. The rules are as follows:

- 1) The design must be done on an official entry blank (attached). Entry blanks will also be available at the Village Hall and Recreation Center.
- 2) Each child turning in a drawing must be an Orland Hills resident under the age of 13, as of January 1, 2025.
- 3) Only one entry per child is allowed; multiple entries will disqualify you from the contest.
- 4) Up to 5 colors may be used, as well as a color background. Ink pens, crayons, or markers are acceptable. No glitter or attached decorations, please.
- 5) All entries must be received at the Village Hall no later than closing time (4:30 pm) on April 14, 2025. There will be no exceptions!

The entry form is created for easy mailing. Just fold in three with the drawing on the inside and staple or tape closed. Now all you need to do is add a stamp or hand deliver. There is a mailbox drop in front of both the Village Hall and Recreation Center. The name of the artist is located on the back of your entry so that the judges will not know who the artist is when looking at the entries.

The Top Five entrants will be recognized with their framed drawing and a picture with Mayor Kyle Hastings. That photograph will be in the Village Newsletter for the whole Village to see. The Top Five winners are entitled to purchase one of the first five vehicle stickers, in the order of their finishing. The entries will be judged based on neatness, creativity, and a positive portrayal of the Village.

BUILDING DEPARTMENT

The Village receives a significant amount of complaints regarding drainage issues. Often this occurs when a neighbor builds up their yard, plants a garden, or puts something in a drainage easement that should not be there. Residents do not always recognize how these actions can affect other yards. Please do not put anything in drainage easements.

In the Village of Orland Hills, it is prohibited to alter side and rear yard drainage easements and swales. The easements and swales are engineered to carry storm water to sewers and detention ponds. The elevations and grades are to be left as they were originally intended. Except for grass, no other landscaping, gardens, or buildings are allowed. Easements and swales that were altered should be returned to their original and intended condition.





All work over \$100 in value requires a permit. Examples of projects that require permits include fences, sheds, pools, decks, patios, walks, sprinkler systems, retaining walls, and driveways. Additions or alterations in electrical or plumbing work require a permit and must be installed to code.

SAFETY TIPS

Loss of utilities can leave communities without such vital services as police, fire, and medical protection. JULIE's tips for outdoor digging projects include:

- 1. Call JULIE (1-800-892-0123) before you dig
- 2. Wait the required amount of time (two working days)
- 3. Respect the marks
- 4. Dig with care

Today, utility companies and municipalities that supply power, gas, water, and telecommunications often deliver these services underground. As a result, JULIE, Inc. and its members are promoting the importance of calling the Illinois One-Call System before you begin any digging projects. They also stress safe-digging practices to professional excavators and homeowners as part of a statewide "Dig Safely Illinois" education campaign.

"According to state law, anyone planning an outdoor project that requires digging, regardless of the depth or the size of the outdoor project, should call JULIE at 1-800-892-0123," said Kevin Chmura, director of Public Relations at JULIE, Inc. "The call to JULIE and service provided by members are free to the excavator. Call center operators are available to receive and process calls 24 hours a day, seven days a week."

JULIE, Inc. is a not-for-profit corporation that provides excavators with a toll-free number (1-800-892-0123) for the free locating and marking of underground facilities. JULIE serves as a notification service for underground facility owners, taking information about planned excavations and distributing this information to its membership. It is then the responsibility of each facility owner to mark the location of their underground facilities at the excavation site. JULIE neither owns nor marks any underground facilities.

JULIE promotes an easier, safer digging environment and serves the entire state

of Illinois outside of the city of Chicago, which is covered by DIGGER. Illinois law requires anyone digging to call JULIE at least two working days prior to the start of excavation and to begin that project within 14 calendar days from the call. The 48-hour notice does not include Saturdays, Sundays or holidays.

Established in 1974, JULIE represents 1,750 members. JULIE has 100 employees during peak periods and is located in a state-of-the-art facility in Joliet, Illinois. For more information visit www.illinois1call.com.

TYPES OF OUTDOOR PROJECTS

Common examples of homeowner projects that require a call to JULIE before digging include putting up a fence, installing a swing set, a mailbox post or new water feature, building of a deck or room addition; preparing a new garden area or adding new trees, bushes or shrubs.
